This is Volume II, No. 1 of the Folio, published by KPFT-FM in Houston as a service to its sponsoring listeners. KPFT is owned and operated by Pacifica Foundation, a nonprofit California corporation chartered in 1946 and, in 1968, authorized to conduct operations in Texas. Pacifica exists to run radio stations which are wholly noncommercial and educational, and is affiliated with no other organization or political party.

The other Pacifica stations are KPFA, Berkeley, California 94704; KPFK, Los Angeles 91604 and WBAI, New York City 10021. Application is pending for a fifth station, which will serve Washington, D. C.

KPFT broadcasts at 90.1 megacycles, with an effective radiated power of 48,000 watts. Our studios and offices are at 618 Prairie in downtown Houston. All station departments may be reached by dialing 713/224-4000. To subscribe to the station, dial 224-9009.

The Folio isn't sold, but mailed free each month to each subscriber to the station. Subscribers are people who contribute to our operational costs, and their gifts are tax deductible in the Internal Revenue Service's highest category of deduction—the rate accorded public charities, up to 50 per cent of your adjusted gross income.
