As usual, we have been searching our collective soul. Some of this painful activity is reflected in this month's folio.

A good deal of it is not. The folio doesn't show the change in our method. Since last spring, programming decisions have been made by the whole staff, in mass meeting. Results quite aside, some of us found this procedure slow and exhausting. Since early September, a smaller committee has been working on program recommendations, thus shifting the grinding detail work to five staff members and two volunteers. This procedure, as it turns out, is also slow and exhausting, but we hope it will draw less energy away from the business of

actually doing the programming.

The committee's proposal for October was surprising: an admission of the insufficiency of their resources in many areas, and a moratorium on changes for the month, so that their eventual decisions could reflect more careful planning and the development of new resources.

In the end, the committee backed down from a total freeze, but more substantial changes are in the wings. They want to listen to the station critically for a while, and they want question, "What is a Pacifica?" The programming committee will meet daily during the first week in October—and they will consider your comments and suggestions.
