

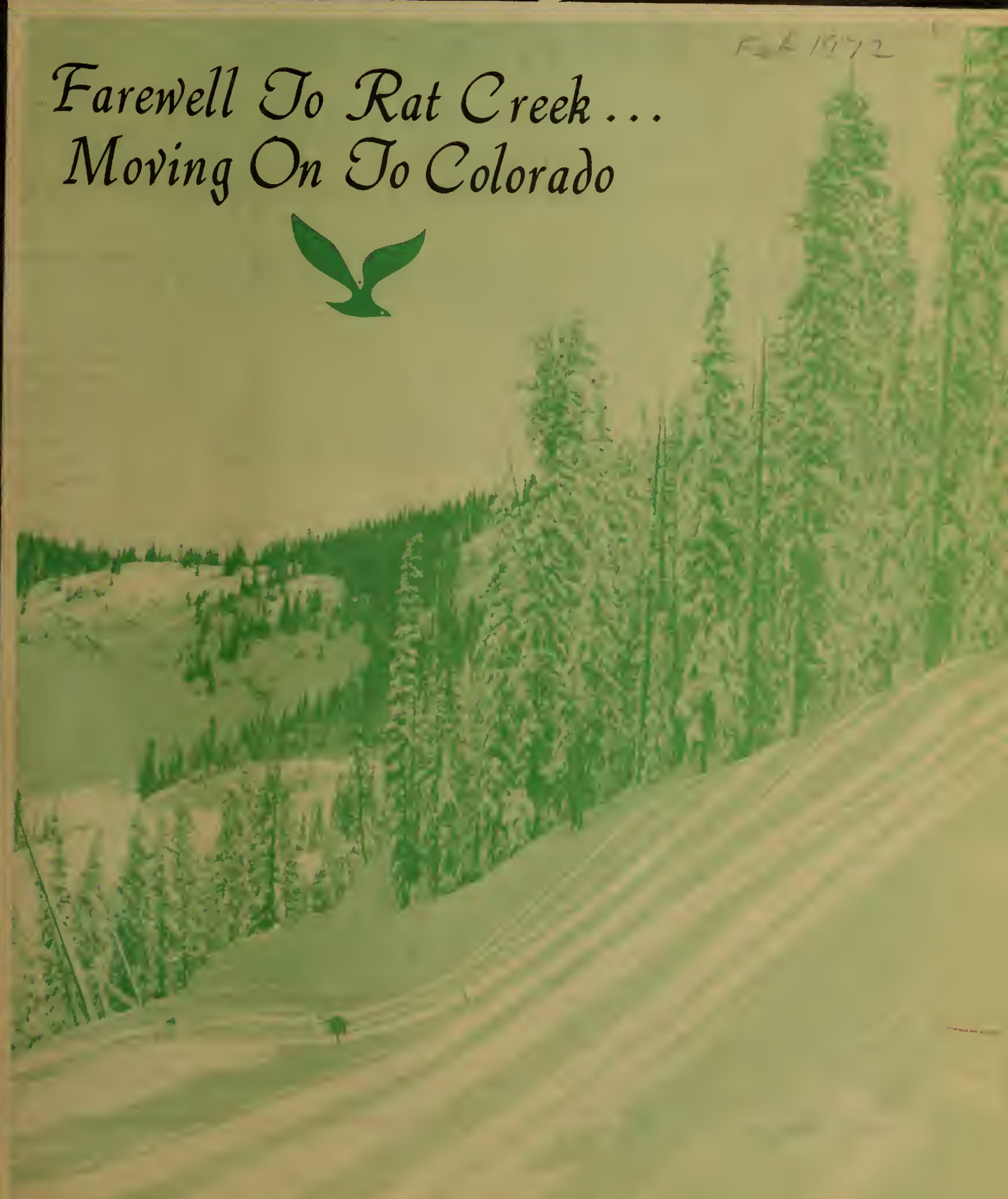

This is Volume II, No. 12, of the Radio Guide, published clandestinely as a ruse to get people to subscribe to pornographic radio stations like KPFT/Houston. KPFT is owned and operated by the Pacifica Foundation, Inc., a California outfit owning and operating radio stations of this ilk in New York, Berkeley and Los Angeles.

KPFT broadcasts somewhere in the vicinity of 90.1 MHz with an effective radiated power of 48,000 watts, whatever that means. These watts are broadcast from a secret location high atop Mt. Houston: studios and offices

can usually be found at the corner of Prairie and Louisiana Streets in downtown Houston. Mail your gripes to 618 Prairie Street. All station departments may be reached by dialing 224-4000. Don't forget to wait for the dial tone.

Those omnipresent Pacifica microphones are still open to all points of view. The ground rules are those of the FCC, good taste, good sense and the Brain Police. No requests for air time for commentary on issues in the public interest have been denied except of course for the little neighbor boy, and he just walked on alone, his guilt so well

concealed. And muttering underneath his breath, "Nothing is revealed."

All gifts to KPFT, including subscriptions, are fully tax-deductible, the station being in the Infernal Revenue Service's highest category of deductibility (public charity). What that means is that you can give to Pacifica, and deduct, up to 50 per cent of your adjusted gross income. A likely proposition.

The Radio Guide is edited,

produced and nursed along by Gavan Duffy who is finally getting some assistance in this matter. At times, however, he gets very tired and disgruntled. He feels that some of you don't appreciate his efforts. So, if you get the chance, drop him a line telling him how great he is, brightening up your life with this splendid accomplishment of print propaganda, what with the world situation being what it is. Sigh.

FROM THE MANAGER

People keep bringing in quotations about the winter of our discontent and trying to explain about karma and vibes and patting each other on the head, saying it will all go away. And it does, from time to time. The despair that comes rolling through the station with a week's worth of bills and about \$16 worth

of subscription money. That's cyclical. Something always seems to happen at the last minute to save the station from ruin. This time it was a loan.

But what next time? The amount of money that is owed to the station by

individuals who pledged to help is staggering — into five figures and not low figures at that. Most of the money is lost forever, promised by people in weak moments. And most of it is in very large pledges, one so large that fiscal planning for the station's future was based on the grant (it is the failure of will involved in that grant that has put the station into the situation you keep hearing about — constant bankruptcy predictions). We wonder sometimes what promises mean anymore. We, for instance, have promised certain things to you (a production studio, more intense community involvement) and have not come through, but we do not feel we've reneged, because we're still trying to do those things. With time, we're as good as our word. The same is apparently not true of those people who have broken promises to help.

The point of that is that real support for the station is coming from People. Subscribers. Last year 51% of KPFT's income was from subscribers, the highest percentage of any of the four

Pacifica stations. A sizable chunk of the other 49% came from the good ol' government, which gave us almost \$34,000. The rest came from community-minded wealthy citizens in gifts of varying sizes, up to \$25,000. It was a good year in that respect. The catch is that almost all of the large amount of money was earmarked for certain things: for instance, \$26,000 from the government was for us to buy the mortgage on our transmitter. So we own it now and our assets are higher by that amount. That didn't change the operations expense problem, however. Earmarked money allows for expansion or reduces somewhat the amount of monthly payments we have to make. What is desperately needed is a grant without strings, that we can use to pay off some old debts and replenish the equipment cache; and a grant that is tied to advertising and promotion. The latter may be possible; the former may not be.

At any rate, it becomes increasingly difficult to deal with the future when we spend all of our time trying to shore up the walls against the past. It has been and always will be the responsibility of the people who support the station to seek out funds wherever they can — whether from rich uncles or from poverty-stricken friends who might be coaxed to subscribe. The number of renewing subscribers that we need (and might have had this year, if not for a bomb, a strike and worthless pledges) is still about 8,000. We now have just under 3,000. That figure could double instantly if each

of you would get one friend to subscribe. Many listener-sponsors have acquired dozens of subscriptions. It's not that hard. You just have to do it.

As far as progress and new ideas go: the production studio apparently will, in fact, be built, under the direction of subscriber Danny Samuels and Rock Romano. We're trying to do something about the wretched decor of the space we now have (we need lots of carpet and acoustic ceiling tiles). For the first time in some months, everything seems to work, thanks to Ray Heinrich, Jon Doyle and Mark Kaplan. We're going to put together morning and weekend news programs. The public affairs section is growing. And there's a lot of good stuff on the air this month. Salzberg, Binaural Theatre, pornography special, the concert for Bangladesh. . . .

And there's an important change. Mrs. Adie Marks, KPFT board chairwoman and long a board member, has resigned. Like managers, the life span of board chairmen is not great, although Mrs. Marks somehow lived out her full year. By the time this *Radio Guide* reaches you, there will probably be a new chairman; listen to Bombay D'or (the new name of Report to the Listener) to find out who's next.

Last, and most important, we need volunteers. We need people who have spare time in the day to come down and answer the phones and learn how to do radio things and participate. We need help. There are far too few of us running this place.

At our December National Board meeting, we agreed that it was possible and desirable to leave the search for solutions to our Houston problems in Houston's hands, rather than National's... the immediate goal being to find the ways for our Board to work comfortably together and with Staff. Though there is still a long way to go, I believe that the immediate goal has been accomplished.

Now, the time has come for me to resign from our KPFT Board and from the National Board of Pacifica Foundation. I feel that there are too many other things in the world that can be more rewarding in my life, and I have come to this decision after deep and lengthy consideration of all factors involved. My decision is strictly my own, having not been suggested nor forced by anyone... though I am sure there will be some, both within and outside the Pacifica "family," who will be pleased.

Service to one's ideals can take many forms and be given under a variety of conditions. There have been many times during my work with the Houston station and the Foundation that have been good and happy times, particularly with my colleagues on the National Board and Foundation personnel. And as you all know there have been difficult times.

Those difficult times have been, on most occasions, a

challenge and have been involving some sort of threat to the well-being and existence of the ideals we all share. But *sharing* the ideals and *fighting* for them are two quite different things.

Lip service is easy. Many, perhaps most, Pacifica people have not found it necessary to give much more than lip service. A few have fought and given more, much more, than anyone will ever know, including themselves. And then a few have taken and destroyed, with total disregard for the life of that in which they profess to believe. Some have destroyed and hampered the progress of freedom out of ignorance, some from the application of emotion when intelligence and logic were needed, some

for selfish reasons, and some for reasons known only to them.

Fighting threats from the outside, even fighting poverty and hardship, can be invigorating and strengthening. Fighting weakness from within... fighting triekery and deceit from within... fighting blind, emotion-ridden destructiveness from within... fighting purposeful destructiveness from within (any and all of these coming from those who think they are, or pretend to be, working toward our common goal)... these kinds of fights are totally debilitating. I am debilitated.

My regrets in leaving (and there are several) focus mainly around those who are

Of course, now that we have committed ourselves to advertising, we must not run around alienating future ad clients by considering their contribution to the *Radio Guide* prostitution.

My sincere hope is that their loyalty and helpfulness will be appreciated and, more important, successful.

My leaving Pacifica will hardly cause a ripple. I believe this, as I've said on more than one occasion, because the idea is strong and there are always, thank God, those who are fresh for the new trials that most certainly lie ahead in the uphill battle for all our freedoms.

I thank those of you who have been so encouraging to me personally and have stood by with affection and selfless sacrifice. You have enriched my life immeasurably, and without you, I would have been mentally immobile.

By resigning now, our Local Board will have ample time to select a new Chairman and to suggest a new person to the National Board before the meeting in Houston in February.

transmission to the listener by a stereo radio station, and 3) listening to the program with stereo headphones." NCAE, which has spent a lot of time in research into binaural effects and techniques, says binaural recordings may be listened to monaurally or with stereo

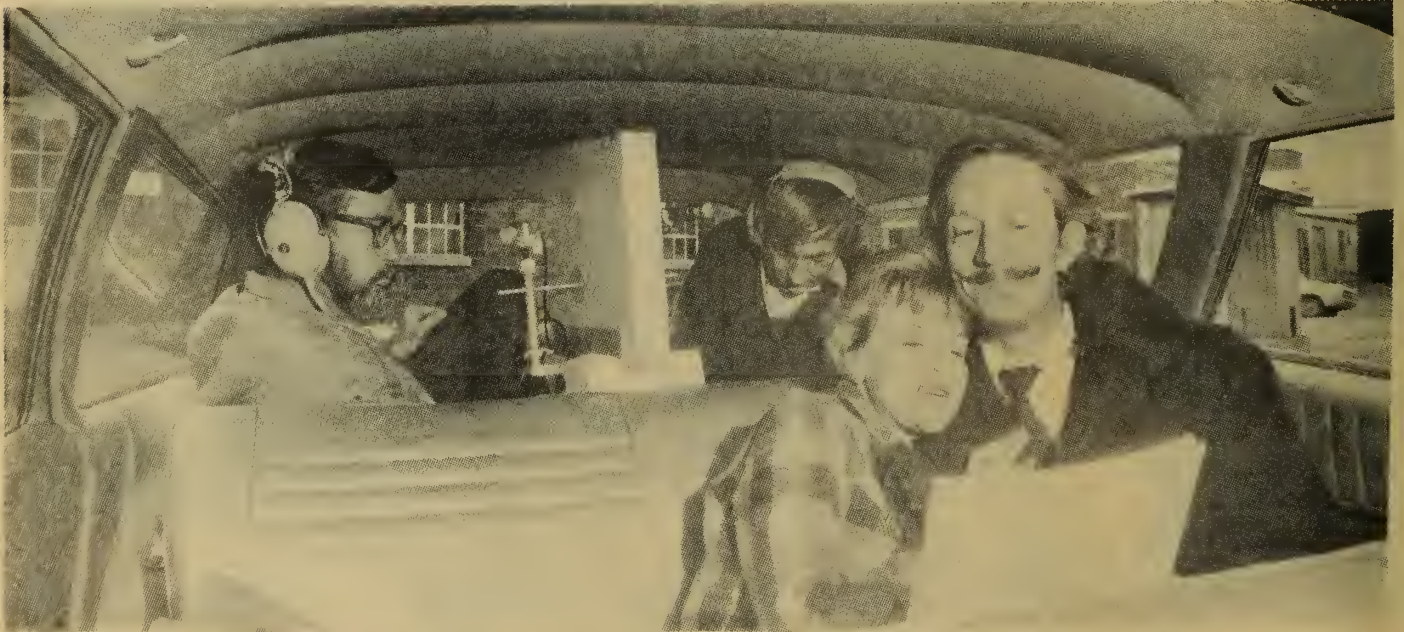
speakers, but that in each case the unique qualities of binaural sound are lost.

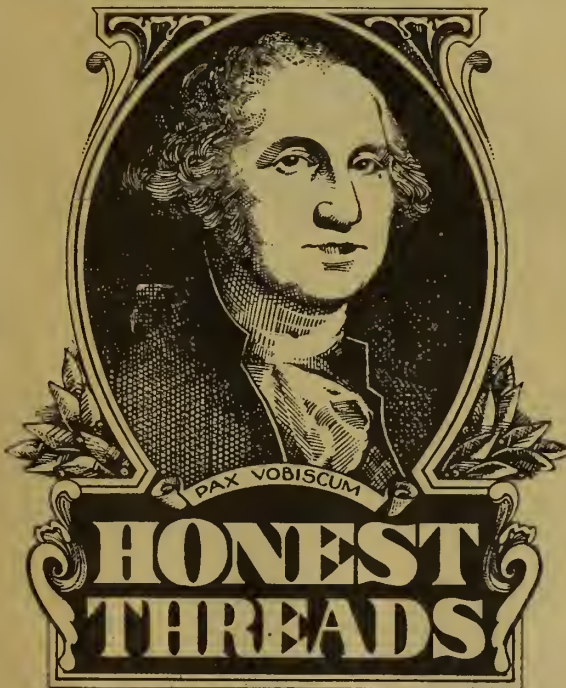
