LET'S HEAR IT FOR THE FIRST AMENDMENT

[WHILE WE STILL CAN]

GOVERNMENT CENSORSHIP is about to take a great leap forward. A government agency—the Federal Communications Commission—believes it has the right to act as our parents and restrict the broadcast of certain words at times when children just might be listening—*regardless of any literary, artistic, or social value or the fact that this could seriously limit free expression in the broadcast medium.*

The FCC acted after WBAI—a listener sponsored Pacifica radio station in New York—broadcast a monologue by comedian George Carlin about “seven words you can’t say on TV” which satirizes how people get uptight by the use of certain words.

Their mailbox clogged with one letter of complaint, the FCC ruled Pacifica to be in violation of the Federal Communications Act. In deciding that a government agency has the right to tell broadcasters what they can or cannot say on the air, they essentially trampled all over the First Amendment.

When Pacifica challenged this ruling, a U.S. Court of Appeals held that the FCC had overstepped its authority in banning “indecent language” at certain hours and that it had wrongly entered into “the forbidden realm of censorship.”

Undaunted, the FCC has now taken the “Carlin Case” to the Supreme Court which will consider this critically important constitutional question: *Do all First Amendment rights traditionally enjoyed by free press also extend to radio and television?*

Opposing the FCC—standing up for the right to broadcast a free flow of in-

formation and your right to hear it—is Pacifica radio. Broadcasting for thirty-two years, Pacifica is known as “First Amendment Radio,” unrestricted by advertisers and committed to the presentation of all points of view.

What happens in the Carlin Case will not only affect Pacifica but the entire broadcast industry as well. And this, of course, affects YOU.

It’s been a tough and expensive battle for us. . . . Now we’re asking for your help. Your contribution to the Pacifica First Amendment Fund will help insure that one of our most basic freedoms—the freedom of speech—will remain intact. And, it will help us keep on broadcasting words that the government would rather not hear.

June 21st

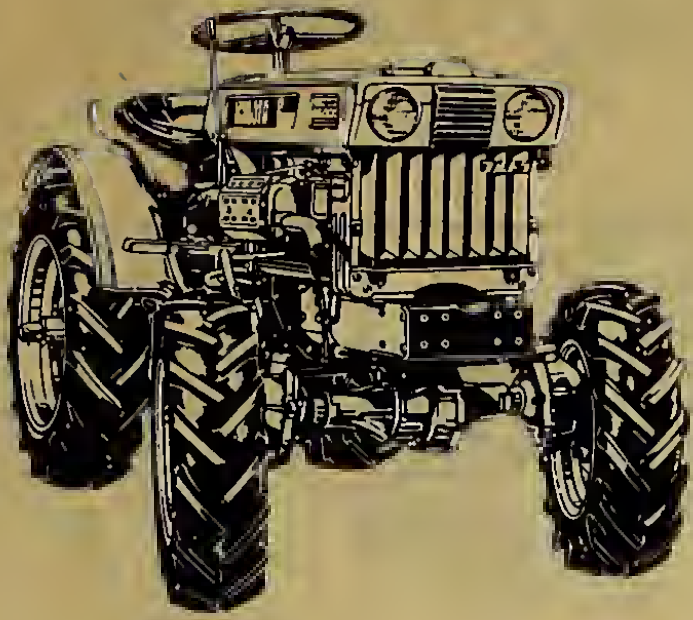

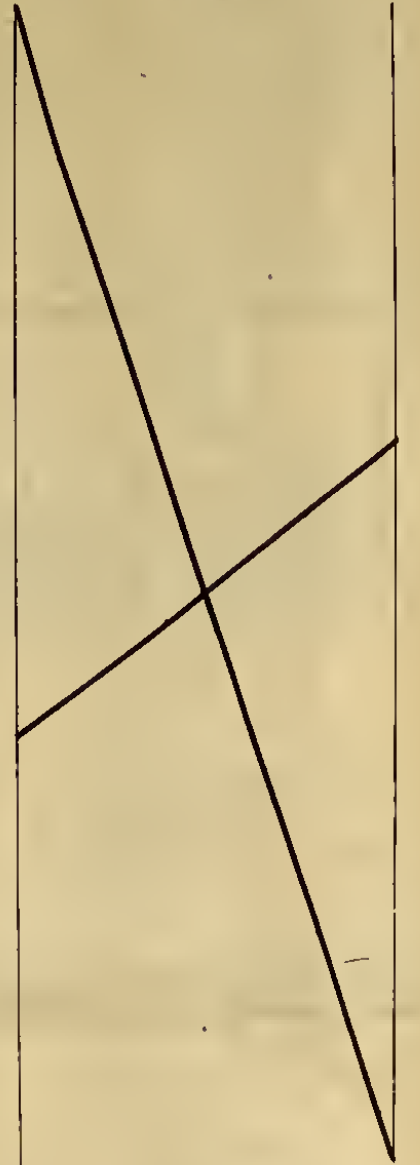

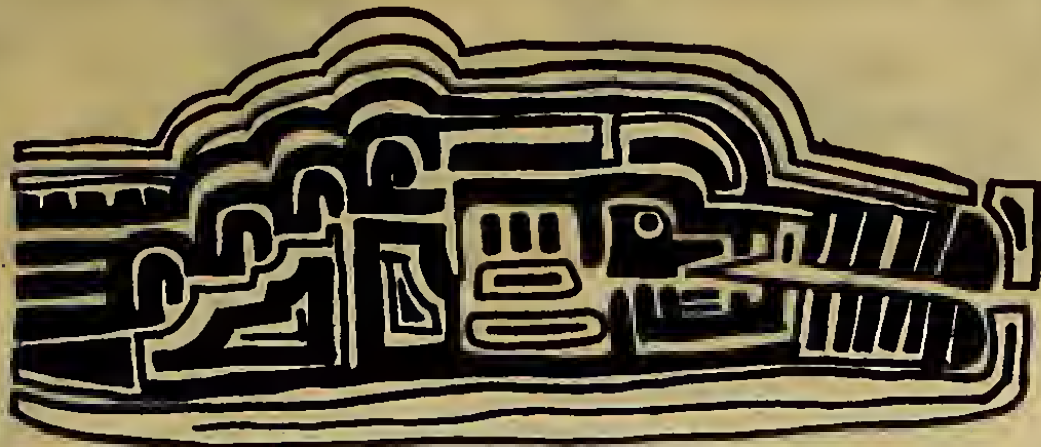
June 29th

June 2

*Betty Carter and the John Hicks Trio—The Mark Levine Ensemble—*Jazz critic Leonard Feather has called Betty Carter "One of the few real jazz singers in terms of improvisation and feeling." She appears in concert with pianist John Hicks, formerly with Art Blakey, and his trio. Pianist and composer Mark Levine has been playing in and around the Bay Area for over six years. He has written music for both Joe Henderson and Eddie Henderson and has led his own ensembles featuring saxophonists Dave Liebman and Ray Pizzi. Recorded at the Great American Music Hall in San Francisco on March 7, 1978. (NPR).

June 9th

Eubie Blake—New Leviathan—Bob Greene—(Billy Taylor hosts) At 94 years of age, Eubie Blake reigns as the legendary master of the traditional jazz piano. The New Leviathan Oriental Fox Trot Orchestra has not only rediscovered the Fox Trot, but has flaunted it everywhere from posh New Orleans social gatherings to NBC's airwaves on "Saturday Night Live." Bob Greene is probably the greatest living exponent of Jelly Roll Morton. Recorded at the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival in April of 1977. (Time: 86:15) (NPR)

June 16th

Don Ellis and the O.S.U. Jazz Ensemble—John Lewis—(Billy Taylor hosts)—Don Ellis is capable of doing almost anything in jazz. He plays several instruments including the trumpet and trombone. He composes, arranges and has been a successful band leader over the past decade. Ellis appears as guest soloist with the award-winning Ohio State University Jazz Ensemble performing on the Ohio State Campus in February of '77. (Source John Archer, WOSU-FM). Pianist John Lewis is best known as the founder and musical director of the Modern Jazz Quartet. Lewis, whose playing displays subtle rhythmic patterns and a deep feeling for the blues, is a vital composer. He performs alone at the 1977 Montreux Jazz Festival, Switzerland. (NPR).

June 23rd

The Charles Mingus Quintet—Ed Blackwell—Sources—(Billy Taylor hosts)—Bassist, composer, and arranger Charles Mingus has been a primary force in modern day jazz. Mingus is joined on stage by tenor saxophonist Richi Ford, trumpeter Jack Walrath, pianist Bob Neloms, and drummer Danny Richmond. Ed Blackwell, a veteran of the Ornette Coleman Band, is looked upon as one of the most musical drummers to emerge from the avant garde of the '60's. Featured with Blackwell are clarinetist Alvin Batiste and pianist Ellis Marsallus. Playing in a variety of

styles, Sources music represents original and vital experiments in jazz. Recorded at the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival in April of 1977. (NPR).

June 30th

Oscar Peterson & Friends—Ray Bryant—Dizzy Gillespie—Benny Carter—(Ed Williams hosts)—Piano genius Oscar Peterson jams with trumpeters Dizzy Gillespie and Clark Terry, saxophonist Eddie "Lock-jaw" Davis, bassists Niels Pederson and Ray Bryant solos on piano and then joins saxophonist Benny Carter. Recorded at the 11th Montreux Jazz Festival in Switzerland in July of 1977. (Time: 85:29) (NPR).

The 39th National Folk Festival: Once again, Wolf Trap Farm Park resounds with the music of the nation's oldest folk festival. Country, Cajun, bluegrass, and old-time styles are represented in performances by Rose Maddox, the Balfa Freres, Ted Lundy, Bob Paisley and the Southern Mountain Boys, and Albert Hash with the Whitetop Mountain Band. A special treat will be the exciting traditional music and dance by a group of second-generation Ukrainians who go by the name of Cheremosh. Steve Rathe hosts. Vibration and Echo: Festac '77: From the Nigerian National Theatre in Lagos, Nigeria come highlights of the 1977 Second World Black and African Festival of Arts and Culture. Featured on this special program will be the great South African singer Mariam Makeba, "The Mighty Sparrow"—Calypso King from Trinidad, the Trinidad and Tobago "All Stars" Steel Band, "Space Music" by Sun Ra, and musicians from all over the African continent. What Sum Concerts presented was, in fact, the first major blues festival in this part of the country...and (the audience's) appreciation surpassed any European blues festival crowd."

Well, we do know when they'll be doing it again—heck, we just told you too—and this year's headliners include Gatmouth Brown, Eddie (Cleanhead) Vinson, Arnett Cobb & the Mobb, Sam Blue, Blind John Davis, and Chicago's dynamic KoKo Taylor. Special attractions are Bib Mama Thornton (creator of Elvis' *Hound Dog*) and zodico master Clifton Chenier with his Red Hot Louisiana Peppers. So on Juneteenth 1978 go on out to the hill for a wang-dang-doodle...and all that weekend listen to the mighty 90 for interviews and all that good-time music!
