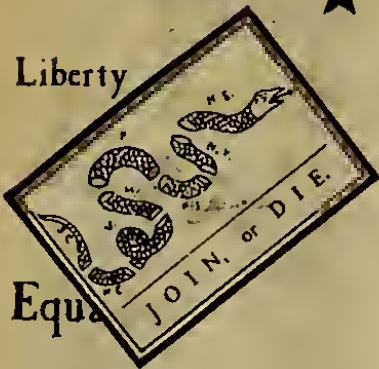

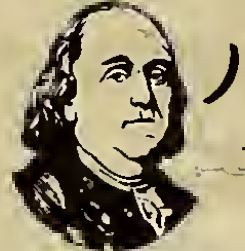

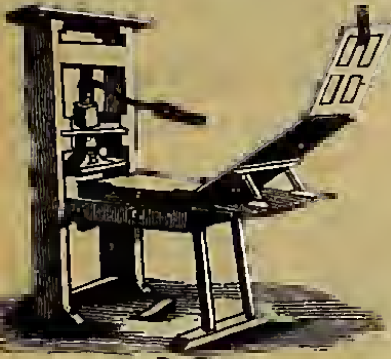

the ideals it stands for wish to express profound thanks for this long-standing show of community support.

In addition, KPFT will sound better on radios all over Houston, and it will be heard regularly in places where reception of KPFT's signal and message was an occasional atmospheric phenomenon.

Despite great odds and set backs, KPFT has grown and taken root in Houston. It will continue to grow. The July 2 event will serve to graphically confirm this hopeful trend.

Tech Talk

New Transmitter: 100 KW/E.R.P.

In the battle for more millivolts per meter, finally KPFT moves to 100KW. When KPFT went on the air in 1970 its 50KW at 450' antenna height provided a competitive signal. Since then, everything has changed. FM is now the major radio force, and of all commercial Houston radio stations, only KIKK is operating at less than the 100KW area. KIKK is pushing less than 100KW only because of a close spacing problem with a frequency allocation in Tomball.

Our new transmitter project is valued in the \$150,000 range. The impetus for getting things under way was provided by HEW's Educational Broadcasting Facility Project Division. A tip of the hat to HEW's Dr. Adolph "Dutch" Koenig and Stu Hallock for their help in making KPFT competitive is in order. Chief Engineer Joe Bleakie and General Manager Michael August have been working overtime these past few months to bring the transmitter project to fruition by the July 2 target date.

The time is well overdue to bring KPFT out of the competitive standpoint of a 1969 framework, signal-wise. Yes, from 50 to 100KW Effective Radiated Power—that's a

3dB increase in signal strength at your receiver. 3dB better than a marginal signal is a good signal; 3dB better than no signal in our fringes out toward central Texas is some signal. An improvement anyway you look at it.

Moving the Megahertz

In order to increase power to an ERP of 100KW, we need to get the required 18.52KW to our Collins 37CP10 ten bay circularly polarized FM antenna. Unfortunately, our present 51.5 ohm TV transmission line with a matching section for the 50 ohm antenna is not substantial enough to accept the necessary power out of the transmitter, of 21.24KW. The transmission line, being 87.2% efficient, loses 2.72KW in the 475' up to the antenna. So, we had to replace our transmission line, with seven thousand dollars worth of Cablewave Wellflex 3" semiflexible transmission line. HL&P installed another transformer on their pole for a real delta-wye transformer transient suppression for the 36,000 watts that the new transmitter will pull. This does mean a higher electric bill, needless to say. The \$350/month we pay now for transmitter power will be increased to approximately \$600.

The transmitter, a CSI T-25-FA, rated at 25KW out, is a dual cabinet grounded grid design, essentially the same with some improvements, to the CCA transmitter design of the same power level, and before CCA, ITA. The two broadband triode amplifiers are driven by a phase locked loop frequency synthesized direct FM exciter. Designed by Bernie Gellman, CSI is the latest incarnation of Bernie's transmitter company, now located in Boynton Beach, Florida. He also sold a transmitter of the same ilk to KRBE as a standby last year. With a list price of around \$36,000, Bernie "wanted a transmitter package in this part of the country". CSI is selling the entire transmitter package, including dummy load, coax switch, remote control interfaces, remote power control, and VSWR monitor. This

transmitter configuration will allow KPFT triple redundancy. If the CSI final stage fails, the 3KW driver can still run through the inactive final; or we can switch over to our current Collins 830F1B, which we're keeping as a standby. Only a power failure could put 90.1 off the air in Houston with its installation. Remote control for the new transmitter will be accomplished with a Time and Frequency Technology 2510 digital remote control, relieving transmitter operators of the task of figuring out which meter scale to read.

Digital technology entering the remote control and monitoring area of KPFT will allow us to consider taking advantage of A.T.S. (automatic transmission system) a set of rules recently adopted by the FCC that essentially allows the technical end of a radio station to operate itself. Automatic controls on modulation level and power level will allow operators to dispense entirely with transmitter logs, and reduces mandatory transmitter site visits from weekly to monthly occurrences.

But What About High Fidelity?

In pursuing the technology of higher power and A.T.S., we haven't lost sight of the purpose of FM broadcasting—lowest possible noise and distortion. A Harris Corp. MSP-15 digitally driven stereo generator, will guarantee lowest noise and distortion from this vital component in the air chain. We can't think of another Houston FM station that comes close in terms of high fidelity.

Live Action Radio

Also encompassed in the HEW project are a pair of 450 MHz Remote Pickup Units. These RPU's, Marti RPT25's, are a pair of transmitters and receivers on 450.35 and 450.85 MHz that allow KPFT to broadcast any event in stereo high fidelity from nearly anywhere in a twenty mile radius of our studios. With an extra antenna, they could be operated in mono using one of the pairs as a

"repeater" where it receives and retransmits, doubling range. This system was installed and is working—so expect instant news and events on KPFT.

Future Games

After our move to 100KW, only one other ploy could increase our usable signal strength, a tower with more height. Projected for 1979, KPFT plans to erect an 1100' tower to the east of town, using the same transmitter with a twelve bay antenna to make up for the transmission line loss. This will be augmented by KPFT's acquisition of KPFT-AM, a four tower five kilowatt directional array in Alvin on 1120 KHz, among the first stations in Houston to go on the air with the new NASC AM stereo system. Video will not remain untouched in the future. KPFT Video, a slow scan service could transmit one frame every several seconds on our 67KHz SCA (Subsidiary Communication Authorization) for use in educational as well as "radio for the deaf" services. This could grow into Houston's only esoteric video service, a multipoint distribution service that would broadcast television on 2.2 GHz. Anyone or any group interested in investing the less than \$200 for antenna and downconverter could receive Pacifica free television programming, a video service that could do anything, free of the restraints of licensing and economic boundaries of conventional VHF/UHF television. While the new tower, AM, and video seem rather distant at this point, its all easily possible with ten thousand listener sponsors contributing \$5 each monthly, or equivalent. 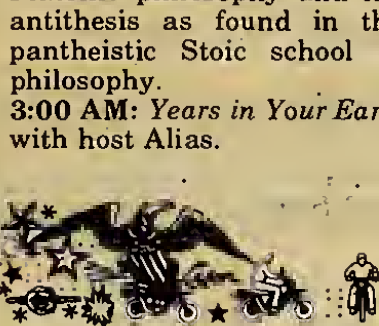
