A Summer Evening With the President

How the Rats Stormed the Belfry

They have created a monster. How can I ever be satisfied by covering the Houston City Council, police scandals and the rest of the local garbage?

How will the management, staff, and volunteers ever be able to tolerate my rsvings, tantrums, and fits of madness now that I have come down with the most dreaded of all diseases...Potomac Fever?

Little did I know that what seemed to be a sincere parting gesture by former News Director Hobart Taylor III was in fact a carefully calculated plan to infest my soul with this wretched craving to stay close to the power at all costs. Keeping-your finger-on-thepulse-of-America, as it is euphemistically known among it's victims.

One week before President Jimmy Carter was due to make his first appearance in the Lone Star State since the days of Jerry Ford and the '76 campaign, Taylor approached me about traveling with the President, and more specifically, the White House press corps, after their arrival in Ft. Worth.

That was just a part of the game plan of how this 50,000 watt (soon to be 100,000) broadcasting giant would cover a Presidential visit. There would also be s live broadcast of Carter's speech at a Democratic Party fundraiser and the placement of other strategically located reporters.

Although I privately questioned the judgement involved in the decision to send me to Ft. Worth, considering both our finances and the amount of trouble I might cause for myself upon returning to my native metroplex, I made no objections. There was the rare combination of Tsylor's new attitude of "spend, spend, spend..." and General Mansger Mike August's agreeing to it.

After four days of unsuccessfully attempting to set up our remote broadcast equipment at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, and just the appropriate amount of medicine, I caught one of those cheap stand-by flights to Dallas' Love Field.

There I stumbled into U.S. Representstive Bob Krueger. He had quite a bit to say about Sen. John Tower, his opponent in the November general election, but had few comments indeed about President Carter's visit or whether or not the Shakespearean scholar would seek Carter's help in his bid to unseat the senior Senator of braised barbecue lunch. The scene must have resembled a sinner on The Last Day attempting to get beyond those Pearly Gates without the proper bill of goods.

As I was beginning to develop an explanation which General Manager Mike August might possibly buy, for some unknown reason a White House staffer smuggled me into a mult-box where I would, at lesst, have access to some actuality, a telephone, and a pair of alligator clips. Once again, clean living paid off. Rodrigues, s case of particular concern to the Hispanics.

Rodrigues was shot and killed, Russian-Roulette Style, by a Dallas police officer in 1973. In state judicial prodeedings the officer received a five year prison term. Since that time state Mexican-American leaders have been seeking additional recourse on the Federal Leve!

Recently, the Justice Department announced that after a complete review of the case, no further indictments will be sought, although it who introduced lame-duck Governor Dolph Briscoe (Best known for appointing five dead persons to official positions within the last year.)

Then, perhaps as a going away present or just because no one else dared risk it, L.D. Governor Brisco was allowed to introduce the Presidne. All through Carter's speech I kept speculating on who he would get to introduce.





As was most of his trip, Carter's speech was void of any great new revelations, as he used his time at the podium to continue his oral bombardment of the Soviet Union and Cuba, and to let the folks know just how many of their fellow Texans are involved in policy making along the Potomac. (POTOMAC!!!...)

After Carter had chastised the Russians, Cubans, and "Special Interest Groups" (Which he claimed were exploiting differences of opinion existing between his various Cabinet members on the subject of foreign policy in order to avoid attacking him personally) the President and his staff, along with 150+ journalists, were whisked away to Houston. There Carter would be the main speaker at a Democratic Party fund-raiser, which the New York Times suggested had been gently shoved down the throats of some of the good-ole Texas Demos. Probably the most significant part of Carter's trip, not that any of it was too earthshaking, was his meeting with a group of state and local Hispanics shortly after his arrival in Houston. Several State Representatives and civic leaders had an audience with the President for over thirty minutes. The hospitality of Texas law enforcement officials towards Hispanic inmates was discussed. Carter promised the group (Which did not include an angered Rueben Bonilla, State Director of the League of United Latin-American Citizens) That he would order Attorney General Griffin Bell to personally review the case of Santos

will continue vigorously with the other investigations and prosecutions of civil rights violations now being conducted in Texas. That, however, did little to maintain the fence-mending which had been accomplished during Carter's Houston stop. The Statute of Limitations in the Rodrigues case expired on July 24 of this year.

The fund raising event had originally been scheduled for Los Angeles and cancelled, then New York, but was again cancelled, leaving Democratic National Chairman John White, a Texan, little choice. He subsequently left others in the same predicament. Regardless, ' Summer Evening With The President" was sold-out ten days after it was announced, and raised close to \$600,000 dollars for the debt-ridden Democratic Party. There had been much made of Texans up for re-election or those seeking new office (like Krueger and gubernatorialcandidate John Hill, the state Attorney General) The gala affair was indeed starstudded. There were Secretaries Schlesinger, Brown, Marshall, Adams, Krepts, the hiarchy of the White House staff, and thirty-seven state reps, not to mention Majority leader Wright. To work the five thousand, who had shelled out \$500 per plate, into the proper orgasmic state for receiving the President, there were remarks from retiring Congresswomen Barbara Jordon, who introduced John White, who introduced Attorney General Hill, who introduced Senator Lloyd Benson,

Texas, in a year in which Texas GOP candidates are better financed and better organized than ever before.

A short while after speaking with Krueger, I was greeted by an old high school frisnd who proceeded to show me a few of the new bars he had discovered since his return to the Big D following his graduation from the University of Texas where he received a degree in English. He is now mowing lawns in the Mockingbird Lane area. It may seem beside the point, but it was our subsequent adventures that evening which caused me to miss the final credentialling session in Ft. Worth that Friday morning. That meant I had no access to Carter. And I had not carried enough cash for a return trip to Houston. For close to two hours, while suffering from severe protein poisoning and the North Texas heat, I shuffled back and forth between the Hilton, where the Secret Service people were based, and the Tarrant County Convention Center, where Carter was scheduled to address about five thousand civic leaders for a

recorder trio. The group's name is Still Music. Its members are Ralph Holibaugh, Travis Franklin and Tom Bickley. These three gentlemen have been playing and teaching in the early music field in Houston for several years. They formed Still Music for the purpose of offering the public a chand to hear good, relatively unexplored repetoire for three recorders in good, authentic performances. In their radio debut, Still Music will perform a late Baroque work by the German 18th century composer Johann Mat-theson. His Sonata IV is for three alto recorders. The other work to be performed on August 7 will be Houstonian Michael Skupin's Romance del ariso de la Fortuna y de la derrota de don Rodrigo. Mr. Skupin wrote his Romance at the request of Still Music specifically for this appearance. Further program notes will be provided on the air by members of the ensemble. Join us Monday August 7, at 8:30 pm when live classical music returns to KPFT via Still Music.

Tom Bickley Heads North John Snyder Becomes Host of the Renaissance

The Renaissance, KPFT's third longest running program, is changing hosts.

Wait, wait, wait, I don't want to write an article about myself. Can't someone interview me and write a little blurb from that? Write what you wish, but l really do want some notice of the change. I am going to Denton to do graduate study in music (composition) at North Texas State University. I first volunteered at KPFT in the summer (June) of 1975. In September of 1975 Bob Rogers, manager, offered me a time slot on Sundays from noon to 2 pm. The program was called Musica Omnivaga, i.e. music roving everywhere and featured early and other musics. In late '76 the program changed names to the Renaissance and moved to prime time on Thursday nights, then shortly thereafter moved to its present slot on Mondays.

In the beginning it was a real struggle. I would be preempted at the drop of a hat, but I kept on and so did audience. When I first volunteered there was no Fine Arts or Classical music on the air at 90.1. And no one but myself and a few other angry listeners wanted any either. We persevered. As Frederic Douglas wrote, "power concedes nothing if there is no struggle." Managers and power are synonymous. Starting in summer 1977 I co-produced Arts in Houston until November of 1977. The KPFT early Music Ensemble, later called the Camerata Pacifica, was formed, directed, and dissolved by me. We exposed a lot of people to live performances of early music. We must all work diligently to keep community radio representative of all of the community. I appreciate the support Classical music has gotten here at KPFT and emphasize that support must continue and grow!
