October Marathon

As General Manger Michael J. August promised the listeners and supporters of KPFT last March, no pitching for funds would occur on the air till October. This past March, KPFT FM 90.1, the listener-supported, non-profit Pacifica station for Houston, raised \$30,000.00 over the air from its listeners. The sum of \$30,000.00 was the required amount for six months of smooth operating, and the goal was met in three weeks.

In October, KPFT will be raising-\$50,000.00 for another six months of operation. The increase in the amount isdue to a reduction in payroll underwriting provided by various grants and government programs. In addition, if KPFT is to expand its services to the Houston community, it is going to need more funds. The station already ranks fifteenth in the nation in dollar amount of listener support. This would be a great statistic except for the fact that KPFT is located in the fifth largest city in the nation. To achieve its full potential, the station needs to at least double its present annual cash flow.

This October Marathon is shaping up as a milestone event in KPFT's eight year long history. The central event of the Marathon will be an auction at the Old Cotton Exchange building in downtown Houston. It will be held Saturday, October 7, and will be broadcast live over the station's airwayes.

KPFT is extremely fortunate in having Bette Graham White chairing and organizing the auction event. Ms. White, for those of you who are new to Houston. was a mayoral candidate in last November's election. In addition to a political background, she brings to the task of organizing this historic event an impressive record of years of successful fund-raising in Houston. Ms. White has assembled under her aegis an auction committee of very talented, dedicated, and experienced persons representing many community groups and specialized skills. The staff and regular on-air volunteers are looking forward to this committee's auction and are working actively on a day-to-day basis to insure a successful event.
