JEAN:

The suspense is over! And, Ray Hill's promise has come true. By patching and piecing, begging and borrowing, Ray has managed the station to a point where he can leave it in the hands of an experienced radio professional. KPFT Community Advisory Board Chairperson, Jorge Belgrave is delighted. "We have an experienced professional who's committed to building KPFT to be a real Pacifica station, Houston style." Jean will be moving from Columbia, Missouri, where she has been General Manager for the past three years. In that time, the station has progressed from a small starving station of 5-6 people to 25 who have built a station and programming that reflects the diversity of the local communities and the world. As Chairperson of the National Federation of Community Broadcasters (NFCB) she has led the recruitment of women and people of color. In her second term of office, the NFCB Steering Committee is now majority people of color. "Jean will be real, real good (for KPFT)...she has a real commitment to third world people,"

says Hugo Morales, General Manager of KSJV-Radio Bilingue, Fresno, California and former NFCB Steering Committee member.

As Jean arrives, KPFT will be receiving its first Community Service Grant from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) in several years. CPB's Manager of CSG's, Jan Lantz also spoke highly of Jean. "She's certainly an experienced and respected manager." Jean will also have a unique opportunity to select three key staff members. She will be hiring from the best of national and local talent to rebuild the core staff. KPFT's faithful listeners will begin to hear the changes in the quality and scheduling of current programs by the first of the year. There are no plans to format the station or eliminate the diversity of KPFT's programming. Sit back everyone, you're in for a real treat as KPFT joins her sister stations KPFA, KPFK, WBAI and WFPW as the only radio network dedicated to free speech and local diversity in programming...providing the very best of music and culture, news and public affairs, and debates and dialogues on issues of controversy in the local area and the world.

PACIFICA AT THE F.C.C.

A lawyer dubbed by some "the Ralph Nader of the Right", has filed a petition to deny the license renewal of KPFT's sister station in Washington, D.C., WFPW. In a sixty page brief delivered to the Federal Communications Commission, Daniel J. Popeo of the American Legal Foundation, charged WFPW with violating the Fairness Doctrine, broadcasting indecent programming, personal attack without response, and failing to serve the needs and interests of the Washington community.

honor by demonstrating that they believe that we are important enough to muzzle." A September 9th article in the Houston Post quoted ALF's Popeo as stating his group would "not rule out" challenges to all Pacifica stations if they were successful in blocking WFPW's renewal. KPFT's license renewal was granted this year and will not be up for renewal for three years. Sharon Maeda, Executive Director for the Pacifica Foundation is in Houston now and expresses optimism. "This is clearly a free speech issue that I believe even the Reagan FCC would have difficulty pursuing. The bottom line is that WFPW, and all Pacifica stations, have clearly and consistently demonstrated that they do serve the local communities. Pacifica is the only public radio network that is supported by its listeners to such a degree...this year's \$2.5 million budget is over 70% listener support. That is a compelling argument that we do serve the local community interest."

The complaint accuses WFPW with one-sided coverage of numerous issues including the war in El Salvador, racism, nuclear weapons, abortion, the Voting Rights Act, and others. For example, the station aired programming that stated that "...the Reagan Administration and U.S. policies are racist."

The Pacifica Foundation will respond to the charges within 60 days. Then, the FCC must determine whether or not to have open hearings on the matter. While Pacifica is confident of prevailing in such a hearing, it is a very time consuming and expensive process.

Pacifica President, Peter Franck, characterizes the petition as an effort to stifle free speech. "It is ironic that people who claim to believe that government should stay out of people's lives, are now asking government to muzzle a group of radio stations which make it possible to air views they don't agree with. The deregulators want to regulate ideas they don't like. The American Legal Foundation does us

Pledging your tax deductible contributions will also be much easier this year. We will have special phone lines and a different phone number for the marathon. Your calls will be taken immediately, by volunteers who have been trained to ask for the minimum of information and record that accurately so you'll get your pledge bill and return envelope within two days. The Pacifica subscription computer mess is also totally clean and we will be able to have accurate and current information.
