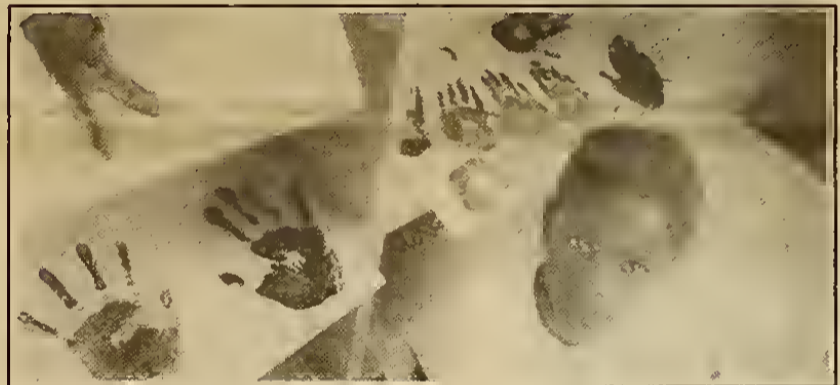

"FREEDMAN'S TOWN UNDER SIEGE"

Following the Civil War and the emancipation, a piece of land that was considered valueless was given to freed slaves. Buffalo Bayou at that time was swamp land. Although it was an insult to the newly freed slaves, they took the land and developed one of Houston's oldest communities: Freedman's Town.

This community is now threatened by developers who want to take Freedman's Town and start developing a "Near Town" upper-class neighborhood. This property of what was once considered valueless land, is now very valuable land in the eyes of several developers.

Shoun Keenan Gilson and I ask you to examine the preservation of this community and what is being done about it. We interviewed the residents of Freedman's town to help understand the importance of maintaining the architectural value and the sense of community that the residents have developed.

We will take you to Allen Parkway Village, one of Houston's oldest public housing communities for the poor, to explore why the residents choose to stay. (Only forty residents occupy a thousand-unit complex.) The Housing Authority has unsuccessfully tried to demolish this complex for the last decade, but has failed. Instead, when one resident moves out, the apartment is boarded up and closed, not allowing any new residents to move in.

KPFT's News/Public Affairs Dept. is producing this feature in conjunction with the Southern Regional Council, an independent broadcast group that focuses on Southern life and aspects of the South. We decided to focus on the Fourth Ward or Freedman's Town because of the history behind the community. We spent several months interviewing residents of Freedman's Town and Allen Parkway Village. We also interviewed the people who want to tear it down.

Listen for "Freedman's Town Under Siege" during our Fall Fundraiser. Formulate your own opinion whether you want to help Houston's oldest black community stay established or that you agree to tear down a piece of history.

FROM THE MANAGER

At this writing, the consciousness of the world's people is focused on fast-breaking events in the Soviet Union, if indeed it is still a union. Through the BBC World Service, KPFT has been able to provide coverage the scope of which would have been impossible a year ago. There is more confidence within the News Department that when you need information most, you can depend on KPFT 90.1 FM. Even Gorbachev depends on the BBC to know what's happening.

September promises to be a month of fast-breaking events here at your radio station. September is the final month of our fiscal year and the race is on to see if KPFT will meet its financial goals for the year. As is always the case, it will be a close race.

On-air "fundraising" starts September 3rd at 6 a.m. We will continue raising money for our regularly scheduled through September 11 at 8 a.m. Then, the Clarence Thomas confirmation hearings will begin. Plans are to broadcast the hearings live, gavel-to-gavel on weekdays through September 23. We will be raising money throughout the duration of the hearings. Regularly scheduled programming in the evenings and on weekends will "fundraise" until September 15.

That may be a little confusing but just tune in and call in. We will be attempting to deposit \$55,000 in the bank from our on-air efforts by September 30. Tell your friends, our friends, their help is needed.

Other major fundraising takes the form of the KPFT Fall Cajun Jamboree, benefiting KPFT and the Dickinson Lions on Saturday and Sunday, September 28 and 29 at Walter Hall Park. The rain out we had during the Gumbo Cook Off in April put a serious dent in our fiscal '91 income. We hope to recuperate most of that loss with only a day to spare before our fiscal year ends. Please join us for **two days** of Cajun/Zydeco fun at Walter Hall Park in League City.

At this end, we are doing what we can to build a stronger KPFT. It is hard for me to impart the urgency of that task to you. There is so much to tell and always so little space. I am glad to get your letters - be they compliments or complaints - because I know you care about this little radio station as much as I do. Usually I don't have time to respond individually to all the correspondence, especially about programming change, because we get so much. I ask that you keep believing in me. Garland and the KPFT staff. We are doing what our best knowledge, research, instincts, data, and listener input tell us will help the station. **According to Arbitron's spring survey (radio's Nielsen ratings) KPFT is reaching its largest weekly audiences ever. 90.1 FM is finally surpassing the ratings for the Iran-Contra Hearings.**

You may not always like the changes taking place, but these changes will make it possible for us to have a radio station and, more importantly, an audience, in the future. Thanks for your kind support.

**"ROCK AROUND THE BACH"
Meet Ken Tucker, Fresh Air's Rock Critic**

Any of us who grew up after the mid-50's was touched by it. It scared the wits out our parents and gave us pleasure. It made people angry, yet set us free. Some thought it was just a passing fad; they were mistaken. Rock 'n' roll was here to stay.

Rock 'n' roll has become more than just another musical form. It is ingrained in our culture, having forever changed the way we think, feel and move. "It used to be an event when a rock band appeared on TV," says Ken Tucker, co-author of "Rock of Ages: The Rolling Stone History of Rock & Roll". "Today rock 'n' roll is on MTV and in magazines. It's covered in ways that were once unthinkable. In the '60's it was thought of as counterculture; now it's mainstream."

Rock 'n' roll has even earned a regular feature spot on the public radio series FRESH AIR, (3 p.m. weekdays on KPFT 90.1 FM). "There's no other place on TV or radio where you can give a thoughtful rock'n' roll music review then play an excerpt of the music," says Tucker.

Although rock 'n' roll on public radio is about as common as Wayne Newton fans at a Grateful Dead concert, it is the music of choice from many public radio listeners. A 1986-87 NPR audience survey shows that NPR listeners bought contemporary rock band recordings more than any other type of music, including classical. That's not too surprising since most public radio listeners grew up with rock. And, as Tucker says, "rock 'n' roll isn't something you outgrow."

Yet things have changed since rock first rolled into the mainstream. "There's a lot less serious rock criticism or rock press around," says Tucker, who tries to help listeners sort the good from the bad.

Heartening for Tucker is how rock 'n' roll in the past few years has regained its power "to shock people and create controversy." One example of that is the rap group Public Enemy. "They're an audio equivalent to a collage, a layering of sounds, melody and snippets from other artists. It's sick and intense and I find it very innovative. I was very pleased to play this music on public radio." Tucker credits FRESH AIR host Terry Gross with helping to raise the status of rock 'n' roll on public radio. "Terry is someone who has no preconceived ideas of high or low culture. She treats rock 'n' roll and all forms of pop culture with the same seriousness and intent that she'd treat someone of high culture. And that raises the tone of coverage dramatically. She's done valuable work devoting long interviews to people who are usually or pushed to the margin."

As a community radio station, KPFT 90.1 FM grows and changes along with the community. Two alternative rock shows on Monday and Tuesday evenings, 10 p.m. - Midnight and a new world music program on Saturday evening. Thanks to Buddy Johnston and Paul Mellatane for their efforts on "Tranquility Bose" and "Love People Reggae". These programs made room for the new. Change, while necessary, is seldom easy.

KPFT's morning drive time is going through some changes of its own. For years, KPFT's morning drive time lineup consisted of a different type of music each morning of the week. There was more than a little disconcerting for the majority of KPFT listeners who were looking for something they could listen to every morning when they woke up. The new morning show will change all of this.

There is a new, stronger emphasis on acoustic music as the primary type of music making up the playlist. Our definition of acoustic is being broadened to include more than just "folk" music. Texas artists, alternative pop and country are just a few of the new sounds you will be hearing. Pe-Te will still be doing cajun music on Thursday mornings. Nothing too hard, the punk and heavy metal shows during late night will cover that. Listen for this new, improved mix of music on the KPFT Morning Show.

The Morning Show will also begin to feature the zany "Ask Dr. Science" (he knows more than you do), and the "90 Second Naturalist". The new Morning Show is just starting off and will be fine tuned as it progresses. The personalities will remain the same. Yours truly will be holding down the fort on Monday. Mike Stroup hosts Tuesdays with Rototin' Ralph, Kathleen and Perry will continue badgering each other on Wednesdays, as previously mentioned Pe-Te and company will be on Thursdays. On Friday morning Rick Heysquierdo and Mory Helen spin the tunes. I am glad to be working with a fine group of people to produce a daily morning program you can listen to every day. Let us know what you think.

A LETTER TO LISTENERS

"Do you know the number to KTRU? I just heard a great song about Elvis on the air. You know, a really great song. I've got to talk to the DJ and find out who did it and where I can buy it."

The song was "Elvis is Everywhere" by Mojo Nixon and Skid Roper. Many KPFT program producers have had a lot of fun with "Elvis" in the past three + years I've worked at KPFT 90.1 FM. In fact, I seem to remember that "Elvis" was on the air when the transmitter was knocked off the air by a storm during a May Marathon. We conjectured that Elvis wanted radio stations as well as boats, planes, etc. Yup, that's 3 years before my friend heard it on KTRU last night.

It's like the time my cousin called me on a week night and said, "Turn on Channel 8, there's a great program on - 'The Lonesome Pine Special!' At that time, 'The Lonesome Pine Special' had been on the air at KPFT twice a week, for two years, with relatively little listener financial support.

It's like the letter from a subscriber who said that this year "her support public media budget went to the UH radio station," but that she planned to split her support between the two next year.

Next year is a little easier for those involved at KUHT, KUHF and even KTRU to think about because today is not nearly as difficult to think about as it is for those involved at KPFT 90.1 FM.

My question to this particular listener, my friend and my cousin is "Why are you waiting to contribute until next year when KPFT 90.1 FM brought the music/news/public affairs to you first?"

I know this is a bold claim and that KPFT 90.1 FM is not first with everything, but there ARE a lot of "firsts" that happen here and that deserves your support.

Being first is not easy because it usually involves controversy and change. The last time I counted the letters in either word, both had more than four. Based on some of the letters we have received lately, I could have sworn that KPFT had committed one of the "Seven Deadlies".

KPFT 90.1 FM is one of those "damned if you do, and damned if you don't" institutions: You like the 88C, you hate the 88C, change the morning programs, leave them alone, "The Power at Pussy" is on all the college radio stations you-over-the-hill conservatives, Pacifica News is great, Pacifico News is too slanted toward the left wing, I loved Peace-watch, "KPFT must learn that not all supporting listeners feel that business and government are inherently evil.", bring back the Music Lady, Bluegrass is okay in small doses, "Ray Hill wears a pink triangle, homosexual pin and testifies to the legislature as if he has authority to do so because he appears on your station," "in '83 & '84, I discovered Breakthrough and Pokey and Cherry helped me to think and to grow", "Enclosed is a check for \$50 and form for corporate matching gift, your programming has improved enormously in the past 1-2 years", "I will increase my support for KPFT when they reconsider their position on alternative music, especially Jay Lee and "Wake Up & Smell the Coffee" & Seamus & Billy Gilbert" (At this printing, Jay Lee and Seamus are back on the air, 10 p.m. - 12 a.m. Monday and Tuesday, respectively, and Billy Gilbert can be heard on Friday nights with the Civil Service Broadcasting Empire.)

All of these remarks were made by you - the listeners. Thanks for your input. As the Program Guide Editor I read all of the letters and try to fairly present positive & negative letters (maybe constructive criticism?) in your column.

Which brings US back to **CHANGE** and **CONTROVERSY**. Think about what this does for you: gets your attention, builds anticipation, stimulates thought, you form opinions, exercise your right to speak out. Congratulations: you are alive, mentally active and living in the good ol' U.S.A.

But, look around you, are there a lot of other public broadcast mediums taking the same chances? Why didn't KUHF carry Alan Watts "Zen Reconsidered" in cooperation with the Blaffer Gallery's exhibition? Why didn't KUHT carry "Tongues Untied" when people flocked to see it when it was shown at the Museum?

Pacifica and its Houston radio station, KPFT 90.1 FM are among some of the few public broadcast organizations willing to take chances and make changes. That's why KPFT attracted you in the first place. We take a chance that you will listen to bluegrass, folk, acoustic music in the morning or alternative music at night. (Believe me, these styles of music aren't really tearing up the Billboard charts!) We take a chance that you want to have the opportunity to form your own opinions by listening to Pacifica News followed by the BBC World Service.

And when changes are made to make your programming choices easier from one day to the next... so that you know that if you tune in to Mixed Messages on Wednesday, then there's a chance you're going to like The Morning Show on Friday. At least you are listening to a radio station that makes you think and presents opinions other than the "head-buried-in-the-sand" viewpoints so prevalent in the U.S.A. media today. Congratulations again, you're conscious!

And because you're conscious - whether you are a conscious conservative, progressive or anarchist - you need to generously contribute to the radio station that did it first and strives to bring you, the listener, more "firsts" in Houston through the efforts of dedicated volunteers, a scrawny budget, an even scrawnier tower and a few human staff members.

Just because KPFT 90.1 FM has been around for 21 years, it doesn't automatically mean that next year is in the bag. Without you, there is no next year for KPFT 90.1 FM and what a terrible loss that would be to all of those voices who broadcast their appeals, stories, opinions, invitations to fundraisers to help other non-profit organizations and needy individuals throughout Houston.

Think about it. Take a chance. Be first.
