### "FREEDMAN'S TOWN UNDER SIEGE"

Following the Civil Wor and the emancipation, a piece af land that was cansidered valueless was given to freed sloves. Buffala Boyou at that time was swamp land. Although it was an insult to the newly freed sloves, they took the land and developed one of Houston's oldest cammunities: Freedman's Town.

This community is now threotened by developers who wont to toke Freedman's Town and stort developing o "Neor Town" uppercloss neighborhood. This property of whot was once considered volueless lond, is now very voluoble land in the eyes of several developers.

Shoun Keenan Gilson and I osk you to examine the preservation of this community and what is being done about it. We interviewed the residents of Freedman's town to help understand the importance of maintaining the architectural value and the sense of community that the residents have developed.

We will toke you to Allen Porkway Village, one af Houston's oldest public hausing communities for the paar, to explore why the residents chaose to stoy. (Only forty residents accupy o thousand-unit complex.) The Housing Authority has unsuccessfully tried to demallsh this complex far the lost decade, but has failed. Instead, when ane resident moves out, the aportment is boarded up and closed, not allowing ony new residents to move in.

KPFT's News/Public Affoirs Dept. is producing this feoture in canjunction with the Southern Regianol Council, on independent broodcost group wha focuses on Southern life and ospects of the South. We decided to focus an the Fourth Word or Freedman's Town because of the history behind the cammunity. We spent several months interviewing residents af Freedman's Town and Allen Porkway Village. We olso interviewed the people who want to tear it down.

At this writing, the consciousness of the world's people is focused on fast-breaking events in the Soviet Union, if indeed it is still a union. Through the BBC World Service, KPFT has been able to provide coverage the scope of which would have been impassible a year ago. There is more confidence within the News Department that when you need information most, you can depend on KPFT 90.1 FM. Even Gorbachev depends on the BBC to know what's happening.

September promises to be o month of fost-breaking events here of your radio station. September is the final month of our fiscol year and the race is on to see If KPFT will meet its financial goals for the year. As is always the case, it will be a close race.

On-air "friendraising" storts September 3rd of 6 a.m. We will continue raising money for our regularly scheduled through September 11 at 8 a.m. Then, the Clarence Thomas confirmation hearings will begin. Plans are to bradcast the heorings live, gavel-to-gavel on weekdoys through September 23. We will be roising money throughout the durotion of the hearings. Regularly scheduled programming in the evenings and on weekends will "friendraise" until September 15.

That may be a little confusing but just tune in and call in. We will be attempting to deposit \$55,000 in the bonk from our on-air efforts by September 30. Tell your friends, our friends, their help is needed.

Other major fundroising takes the form of the KPFT Fall Cajun Jamboree, benefiting KPFT and the Dickinson Lions on Saturdoy and Sunday, September 28 and 29 of Walter Hall Park. The rain out we had during the Gumbo Cook Off in April put a serious dent in our fiscal '91 income. We hope to recuperate most of that loss with only a day to spare before our fiscal year ends. Please join us for two days of Cajun/Zydeco fun of Wlalter Hall Park in League City.

At this end, we are doing what we can to build a stronger KPFT. It is hard for me to impart the urgency of that task to you. There is so much to tell and always so little space. I om glad to get your letters - be they compliments or comploints - because I know you care about this little rodio station as much as I do. Usually I don't have time to respond individually to all the correspondence, especially about programming change, because we get so much. I osk that you keep believing in me. Garland and the KPFT staff. We are doing what our best knowledge, research, instincts, data, and listener input tell us will help the station. According to Arbitron's spring survey (radio's Nielsen ratings) KPFT is reaching its largest weekly audiences ever. 90.1 FM is finally surpassing the ratings for the Iran-Contra Hearings.

You may not always like the changes taking place, but these changes will make it possible for us to have a radio station and, more importantly, an audience, in the future. Thanks for your kind support.

"ROCK AROUND THE BACH"
Meet Ken Tucker, Fresh Air's Rock Critic

Any of us wha grew up after the mid-50's was touched by It. It scared the wits out aur parents and gave us pleasure. It made people angry, yet set us free. Some thought it was just a possing fad; they were mistaken. Rock 'n' roll was here to stay.

Rock 'n' roll has become more than just another musical farm. It is Ingralned in our culture, having forever changed the way we think, feel and move.

"It used to be an event when a rock band appeared on TV," says Ken Tucker, co-author of "Rock of Ages: The Rolling Stone History of Rock & Roll".

"Today rock 'n' roll is on MTV and in magazines. It's covered in ways that were once unthinkable. In the '60"s it was thought of as countercuiture; now it's mainstream."

Rock 'n' rall has even eamed a regular feature spat an the public radia series FRESH AIR, (3 p.m. weekdays an KPFT 90.1 FM). "There's na ather place an TV or radio where you can give a thaughtful rock'n' roll music review then play an excerpt of the music," says Tucker.

Although rock 'n' roll on public radio is about as common as Wayne Newton fans at a Grateful Dead concert, it is the music of choice from many public radia listeners. A 1986-87 NPR audience survey shaws that NPR listeners bought cantemporary rock band recordings more than any other type of music, Including classical. That's not too surprising since most public radia listeners grew-up with rock. And, as Tucker saysa, "rock 'n' rall isn't something yau outgraw."

Yet things have changed since rock first rolled into the mainstream. "There's a lot less serious rock criticism ar rock press around," says Tucker, who tries to help listeners sart the good from the bad.


Heartening for Tucker Is how rock 'n' roll in the past few years has regained its power "to shock people and create controversy." One example of that is the rap group Public Enemy. "They're an audio equivalent to a collage, a layering of sounds, melody and snippets from other artists. It's sick and intense and I find It very Innovative. I was very pleased to play this music on public radia."

Tucker credits FRESH AIR host Terry Gross with helping to raise the status of rock 'n' roll an public radio. "Terry is someone who has no preconceived ideas of high ar low culture. She treats rock 'n' roll and all farms of pap culture with the same serlousness and Intent that she'd treat someone of high culture. And that raises the tane of coverage dramtically. She's dane valuable wark devoting long interviews to people who are usually or pushed to the margin."
